PARISH COUNCIL

The November meeting of the Parish Council was held on Wednesday 29th in the Village Hall. It was attended by the Clerk, seven Parish Councillors, Councillor Alistair Gould and four members of the public.

Neighbourhood Plan: Cllr Heller apologised profusely for putting the wrong date for the last meeting in the Village News! Cllrs Waters and Wakes gave a report in progress. The village survey questionnaires are beginning to trickle in. The closing date has been pushed back to the end of the year so please fill in your questionnaire to take part in the prize hamper draw. The survey is online at

forms.gle/HvjpYxjZewcKsnho8. Paper copies were inserted in last month's Village News or can be obtained from Kim Wakes on 07554 821078. Surveys can be put into drop boxes in local pubs or posted to the Clerk. The next meeting will be held on Wednesday 3rd January at 7.15pm, upstairs in the Red Lion. All welcome.

Hedgehogs: Councillors wish to raise awareness of the plight of hedgehogs, rapidly becoming an endangered species. It was agreed to invite a representative from Kent Wildlife Trust to the next meeting to share information and advice. Staplestreet Flooding: We have received lots of correspondence about the

recent flood on lower Staplestreet next to the new Crematorium entrance. We have been told that a culvert next to the road was blocked and has now been cleared and the flood water pumped away by KCC Highways. The Crematorium will submit a further drainage plan for the development in order to satisfy one of the planning permission conditions.

Oakwell Drainage: Southern Water has commissioned engineering consultants to survey 89 households from Oakwell, up Church Hill and through the village to Fostal in order to map the drains and plan improvement work. Local residents will likely get a call from one of the technicians very soon.

Speed Limits: The council have paid KCC £5,100 to implement 30mph speed limits through parts of Hernhill. Thanks to Cllr Alistair Gould for a grant of £200 from SBC. Hopefully the work will go ahead in the new year. KCC provide a toolkit to assist in implementing this including bin stickers, posters, etc. We will also have the opportunity to set up a Kent Police Community Speedwatch Group, trained volunteers will use speed indication devices to monitor traffic at times and in areas of concern. This work is overseen by the PSCO team and we will ask PC Gary Morris to talk about it when he next comes to a PC meeting. Finances: The council approved next

year's budget to include an increase in precept. This takes into account maintaining our statutory reserve, as well as putting money aside for the next Highway Improvement Plan and for the Neighbourhood Plan. The Clerk's hours of work have been increased to align with national norms for our sized council and thus obviate the need for unpredictable overtime payments.

KALC Awards: The council agreed to adopt the KALC awards once again. The closing date to nominate a villager who has been outstanding in supporting or contributing to our community is 22nd January. You will find a nomination form with this edition of the Hernhill News.

Road closures: Staplestreet will be closed at the Dunkirk end for a few days from 5th December. Fostall on 14th December for one day.

KCC COUNCILLOR

Household Waste Recycling Centres After much jubilation last week at the news that KCC's proposals to close Household Waste Recycling Centres (including the site at Faversham) appeared to have been binned, it seems the celebrations were premature. As opposed to the speculation in the papers at the beginning of the month, news came directly from KCC on Wednesday 15th November that the plans were merely on hold rather than scrapped. Given the amount of media coverage the story received across Kent, it seemed highly unlikely to me that the leadership would push ahead

with the plans against the wishes of the majority of councillors, but given the financial strain the council is under perhaps they see it as unavoidable.

From the outset, the plans never appeared to be fully thought through. I opposed them at length during my group leader's speech at the KCC full council meeting in May and also through my role as chair of the Environment Committee at Swale (a role I'd only been in a few days when the plans were first announced!). If they do resurface, I hope they are accompanied by suitable levels of data and evidence to try and justify how such a backward looking proposal could be considered during a

climate and biodiversity crisis.

Arguments about the size of the Faversham tip which were put forward when the plans were first revealed lead me to believe that KCC will still be looking to close the Faversham site. With this in mind, I will continue working in my dual roles at both Swale Borough Council and Kent County Council to see if a better site can be acquired for a Recycling Centre fit for the future, which will be even more necessary if plans for an additional 2500 houses on the South East corner of Faversham come to fruition.

Local Walking and Cycling Infrastructure Plan Consultation

Still on the subject of consultations, KCC currently have a consultation open on their walking and cycling plans for the county. The plans include 30 key routes across the county which are proposed

for improvements. There are three key areas in Swale earmarked. Most relevant to our area is a proposal to improve the cycling route along the Lower Road between Faversham and Sittingbourne. It's a route which can feel fairly dangerous in places for cyclists (and sadly saw the death of a cyclist near Tonge last year). Also featured are plans to improve walking provision around the northern side of Sittingbourne and cycling provision across the northern coast of the Isle of Sheppey.

SWALE COUNCILLOR Parking Consultation

I know parking is often a contentious issue, and some of the recent changes to car parking charging have caused concern. Swale are currently consulting on a draft parking policy, so this is an opportunity to have your say, by e-mailing comments to

policyteam@swale.gov.uk

There are always competing considerations around car use so I would encourage people to take a wider view: car parking and road space are always going to be limited, and the appearance of free use of empty roads conjured up in every car advertisement needs to be recognised as an illusion.

Car parking charges form an important part of the Council's income, so we will also need to balance this against the fact that for some people car use and car parking is unavoidable, especially given the state of public transport. However, more use of public transport is a vital part of reducing congestion and greenhouse gas emissions, and if car parking charges are set too low, then this further tips the cost-balance against choosing to leave the car behind if you have that option.

There are also possibilities of using car parks to encourage travel options beyond conventional cars: how much space should be given to electric charging points or cycle or motorcycle parking?

I hope this gives some food for thought.

CHURCH LETTER

In 2020, Mariah Carey's *All I want for Christmas is you* topped the UK charts 26 years after its release. I can't think why it took so long for it to make it to number one? Because the song had a new meaning in 2020 after people's experiences of the lockdown in the Covid-19 pandemic. Following months of isolation people realised that actually being with loved ones was more valuable than any gifts. Mariah's song expressed the feelings and wishes of many.

Christmas is a special time. When I was growing up Christmas was a time to visit our family members in the rural areas. Our time there included lots of eating, usually a cow or goat was slaughtered to feed everyone. Evenings were spent around a fire listening to folk tales, singing, and eating roasted maize, peanuts and more.

Other than attending a church service, Christmas day was an opportunity to show off new clothing. In many households, 'Christmas clothes' were the only present for the children. It was a sad day for those who did not have new clothes! Some would stay indoors to save themselves from the humiliation.

When we were older and could understand things better, my mother always asked what we wanted for Christmas. The stark choice was between paying the school fees or new clothes. We normally chose the former, because looking ahead to the academic year, it was painful to be sent back home for not paying the fees. However, to make it up, my mum would buy us new clothes or

presents at other times.

Christmas, however, is not totally about gifts, they are just part of it. It is a time to remember the birth of Jesus, also known as Immanuel, God with us. The shepherds who visited Jesus on the night of his birth, did not bring gifts. People in ancient Israel expected someone mighty like King David to lead them into conquering the Roman rulers who governed them. The birth of Jesus was different from what they expected. He was born in a manger, instead of a palace. His birth was announced by angels. A choir of angels sung in celebration. The shepherds' visit was a special time that spoke of who Jesus was. The three wise men who later visited Jesus brought with them gifts. Remember the carol, 'We three kings of orient are bearing gifts we traverse afar.' Each gift was meaningful as it pointed towards the purpose of Jesus' life. Gold symbolising Christ as King. Frankincense symbolising Christ as the High Priest. Myrrh a perfume, symbolising Jesus' death to save people.

Gifts remind us of God's gift to us, Jesus. Receiving this gift has made a difference in my life. Gifts are all very well but the best is actually to be with those we love – presence not presents – that then allies to what God did for us in Jesus, *God with us*, Immanuel.
